- 4. If delivering pupil instruction virtually, the District/PSA will
 - provide pupils with equitable access to technology and the internet necessary to participate in instruction, and
 - expose each pupil to the academic standards that apply for each pupil's grade level or courses in the same scope and sequence as the District/PSA had planned for that exposure to occur for in-person instruction.
- 5. The District/PSA, in consultation with a local health department will develop guidelines concerning appropriate methods for delivering pupil instruction for the 2020-2021 school year that are based on local data that are based on key metrics. Note: A determination concerning the method for delivering pupil instruction shall remain at the District/PSA Board's discretion. Key metrics that the District/PSA will consider shall include at least all of the following:
 - o COVID-19 Cases or Positive COVID-19 tests
 - o Hospitalizations due to COVID-19
 - o Number of deaths resulting from COVID-19 over a 14-day period
 - o COVID-19 cases for each day for each 1 million individuals
 - o The percentage of positive COVID-19 tests over a 4-week period
 - Health capacity strength
 - o Testing, tracing, and containment infrastructure with regard to COVID-19
- 6. If the District/PSA determines that it is safe to provide in-person instruction to pupils, the District/PSA will prioritize providing in-person instruction to pupils in grades K to 5 who are enrolled in the District/PSA.

- 7. The District/PSA assures that
 - instruction will be delivered as described in this plan and re-confirmed by the District/PSA Board.
 - the description of instructional delivery in this plan matches the delivery of instruction to be delivered during the 2020-2021 school year,
 - the District/PSA will re-confirm how instruction will be delivered during the 2020-2021 school year thirty days after ISD approval of the plan, and every 30 days thereafter at a meeting of the Board, and
 - public comment will be solicited from the parents or legal guardians of the pupils enrolled in the District/PSA during a public meeting described in PA-149.
- 8. The District/PSA will ensure that students with disabilities will be provided with equitable access to instruction and accommodation in accordance with applicable state and federal laws, rules and regulations.
- 9. The District/PSA will ensure that two (2), 2-way interactions occur between a pupil enrolled in the District/PSA and the pupil's teacher or at least one (1) of the pupil's teachers during each week of the school year for at least 75% of the pupils enrolled in the District/PSA. The District/PSA will publicly announce its weekly interaction rates at each District/PSA Board meeting where it re-confirms how instruction is being delivered. The District/PSA will make those rates available through the transparency reporting link located on the District/PSA website each month for the 2020-2021 school year.

Learning Plan Narrative

Opening Statement

 Please provide a statement indicating why an Extended COVID-19 Learning Plan is necessary to increase pupil engagement and achievement for the 2020-2021 school year.

The COVID-19 pandemic could impact the students of the Grant Township School in a number of ways. Concerns in which we anticipate with students include: gaps in learning and social/emotional issues. As we return to school face-to-face, our first priority will be to ensure the well-being of all members of our school community. The teacher will need opportunities to examine student work and determine what comes next in the learning process for each student. Additionally, staff and students have the need to prepare for transitioning into online learning if the virus forces the district to fall back into a distance learning mode. This extended learning plan will ensure that there are structures in place to help foster engagement and achievement for all students. students and staff.

Goal 1 - All students (K-8) will improve performance in Reading/ELA from Fall to Spring as measured by benchmark assessments administered three times during the school year.

Goal 2 - All students (K-8) will improve performance in Mathematics from Fall to Spring as measured by benchmark assessments administered three times during the school year.

The Grant Township School will utilize the Early Literacy and Mathematics Benchmark Assessments (grades K-2) and the Smarter Balanced Interim Assessments (grades 3-8) at the beginning, middle, and end of the school year to assess individual student progress in grades Kindergarten through 8th. The teacher will use benchmark as well as formative assessment evidence to monitor and evaluate patterns and trends in student academic performance and to provide guidance for adjusting curriculum and instruction across grade levels.

Instructional Delivery & Exposure to Core Content

For the 2020/2021 school year, The Grant Township School District will be delivering our curriculum face-to-face. The Grant Township School's Return to Learn plan is aligned to the state required and strongly recommended protocols. In phases 4 and 5 our district goal is to teach all students, grades PreK - 8, face-to-face as much as possible by practicing strict safety guidelines at all times. During face-to-face instruction, all students and staff will be kept together for the entire regular school day. At the Grant Township School there will be 12 students receiving full time in-person instruction. In the event of a school closure (Phase 3) due to COVID-19, as laid out in full detail in our Return to Learn plan, instruction will continue on a virtual platform and student work packets will be sent home weekly.

The Grant Township School will follow Michigan's Common Core Standards. In-person learners will be exposed to each standard with traditional methods, while also utilizing an electronic platform to prepare students for future possible distant learning. In the event of a closure, the teacher will continue to engage students in learning remotely. The teacher will use best practices for engaging students and creating equal opportunities for growth.

Students at the Grant Township School are regularly assessed at the classroom level to determine if they are making progress toward meeting those standards. The teacher places a heavy emphasis on daily classroom assessment. This is critical in the instructional process so that students receive timely feedback that helps them know what they need to do to improve. It also gives the teacher important information so they will know how to adjust the teaching and learning process to meet each student's needs. The teacher keeps up-to-date information on student performance and grades which parents are able to see anytime. At the end of each marking period, parents will also be provided an official report card, providing information on each class or curricular

area. In addition, parents and guardians are kept informed of all expectations through phone, messenger, and twice a year Parent/Teacher conferences.

The Grant Township School ensures all students will be provided equitable access to technology and internet service. This was described in our Continuity of Learning Plan that was previously submitted to the state. We have surveyed families as to their individual technological needs, and will provide the necessary technology to those families who do not have adequate devices or access at home.

When school starts, students' IEPs will be reviewed in coordination with general and special education teachers and/or providers to address any data-driven accommodations and/or services that are needed due to known changes in students' needs. The district has established structures for general and special education teachers and/or providers to collaborate and communicate regarding student performance and student needs on IEP goals and objectives with special consideration regarding assistive technology and accessibility. The Grant Township School District ensures a continuation of services for students receiving speech and language, occupational therapy, physical therapy, or social work services provided in the student's IEP. The district also ensures a method for the continuation of evaluation for students suspected of having a disability as well as those requiring re-evaluation.
